PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE:

A major interest and area of professional practice is in the field of free ranging wildlife. I have an abiding interest in the interface between humans and wildlife, and how we use the many species with which we share the globe.

I have worked with free-ranging wildlife in several areas of Africa, and taken part in the capture and translocation of over 100 rhinoceros and a similar number of elephant. Between 1968 and 1975 I also looked after the group of white rhinoceros that were held in Meru National Park, Kenya, attending to their medical problems. I was involved in the capture of several other wild species.

I have also assisted a team of researchers from the New York Zoological Society with the capture & radio-collaring of forest elephants in the Korup forest area of Cameroon. While on sabbatical leave in Africa in 1997/98 I worked on rhino, wild dog, lions, hyaenas and elephants.

In 1975 I spent 6 weeks in Rwanda as the attending veterinarian dealing with the culling and translocation of the last of the savanna elephant in that country. A thorough account of this exercise is given in "Wrestling With Rhinos" as well as in the scientific literature

I took Canadian veterinary students to Uganda for seven years (until retirement) and linked with faculty in the Department of Wildlife and Animal Resource Management at the Veterinary Faculty in Kampala. The collaborative work involved teaching of Canadian students, as well as Uganda graduate veterinarians in several different wildlife disciplines. We visited several national parks and carried out work on species ranging from lions to chimpanzees, rodents and a variety of forest birds.

I have worked in many areas of Canada and been involved with projects that included species as diverse as polar bears, black bears, grizzly bears, grey seals, hooded seals, moose, caribou, wood & plains bison, North American elk, white-tailed deer and wolves.

I have also carried out consulting work with cervid (deer) species in the UK, New Zealand, Australia, Argentina, and the remote island of Rota in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands. I spent three field seasons working with the world's southern-most herd of domesticated reindeer the aimag of Hovsgol in Mongolia.

Zoo animal medicine

I served for 16 years as a zoo veterinarian at the local city zoo in Saskatoon. During this time I developed a blow-gun system for remote delivery of injections to captive animals and was the first person to successfully carry out artificial insemination in white-tailed deer.

Game Farming

I have been involved with wildlife utilization for over 35 years. First in Kenya, where I acted as veterinarian for two private game ranches, as well as work with Kenya National Parks. Other countries included several in Europe, South Africa, Zimbabwe, New Zealand and Australia.

Reproductive research

Since obtaining a Master's degree in 1982, when my thesis work on Reproductive Seasonality of Male Wapiti was published I have continued to study reproduction in a variety of species, with particular reference to semen cryopreservation. The species have included bison, wapiti, bighorn sheep and white-tailed deer in Saskatchewan, and Axis deer in Australia.

Storytelling

I am a member of the Storytellers of Canada / Conteurs du Canada and have told stories professionally across Canada from Newfoundland to Vancouver Island as well as in Australia, New Zealand, Kenya, Uganda and England. I use my own wildlife experiences in my storytelling, weaving folk tales into the accounts where they fit best.
